

CARES ACT - BOLSTERING HEALTH CARE RESPONSE

Addressing Supply Shortages

- Provides \$11 billion in funding to advance the manufacturing of vaccines, therapeutics, diagnostics, and other medical needs of the American people during the COVID-19 public health emergency.
- Allocates \$16 billion to procure personal protective equipment (PPE), ventilators, and other medical supplies for the strategic national stockpile.
- Requires the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to expedite drug applications to prevent drug shortages.

Access to Health Care for COVID-19 Patients

- Provides \$100 billion to support hospitals and health care providers as they face COVID-19 related expenses and lost revenue.
- Provides \$4.3 billion in funding for the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Prevention to support public health preparedness and response.
- Ensures free coverage for COVID-19 testing and vaccines, when made available.
- Includes \$1.32 billion in supplemental funding for community health centers on the front lines of testing and treating patients.
- Supports rural community health outreach to protect rural residents, who are disproportionately older and more likely to have a chronic disease, and therefore at higher risk for severe illness if they contract COVID-19.
- Establishes a Ready Reserve Corps of trained doctors and nurses to respond to COVID-19.
- Removes restrictions on the use of telehealth for Medicare beneficiaries to help vulnerable patients access care while avoiding exposure to others.
- Improves access to home health services and post-acute care facilities for Medicare beneficiaries.

Innovation

- Facilitates partnerships with the private sector on research and development for public health emergencies.
- Speeds up the development of drugs for animals to help prevent animal-to-human transmission, which is suspected to have occurred with the outbreak of novel coronavirus.

Health Care Workforce

 Reauthorizes programs to support clinician training and faculty development programs and help the health care workforce meet the needs of populations at increased risk of contracting COVID-19.
